One of my favorite stories that my adopted grandpa told me was how when he was little, he would get an allowance of a quarter a week and he would go down to a corner store and spend all his money on ice cream and candy (even though he wasn't supposed to) at the end of each month. I also learned about what Marines do in war as he was a Marine for almost 32 years! He had 2 sons and would always tell me stories about them.

Going to visit my adopted grandpa quickly became my favorite part of every week. He once told me, "You are a young, impactful girl. Never let anyone tell you otherwise." To this day, I remember those words. We got very close over the time we had but sadly our time got cut off from Covid. We found a way to communicate by sending each other letters and telling each other how everything was going even after the school program ended. I got a letter from him, and he ended it by saying, "I always had 2 sons and now I have a daughter."

I will never forget how he really wasn't wanting to be a part of the program, but little 5th grade me already had my mind set that he was my new friend. I remember when we went the next week, Miss Kline warned me that there was a good chance that he wouldn't show up, however, when I opened the door, I was presently surprised by him waiting by the door for me. It made me feel quite special to have someone show up the next week for me even though they weren't particularly interested in the program.

I will always remember how much of an impact we had on each other and will forever be thankful for the experience that God blessed me with!

Monthly Maintenance & Service Fee Rates

As discussed at the Annual Financial Meeting on January 24, there will be a **7% increase on each line item** of your invoice for the monthly maintenance and service fee beginning April 1, 2024.

If your arrangement is such that your bank sends a check on your behalf, please inform them of the new amount. If you take advantage of the auto withdrawal process to pay your monthly maintenance fee, our Office will inform your bank of the new rate and no further action is required on your part.

On-Call System

For medical or fire emergencies, please dial 911 directly.

You can reach the maintenance on-call staff by dialing the on-call phone number directly OR pushing the buttons that were provided to you.

The “on-call system” is a direct connection to the staff every minute of every day. The “on-call” system should **only be used for urgent maintenance/grounds issues that require immediate assistance.**

If the office is open, please do not use the “on-call system” to report routine maintenance/landscape items.

Addresses

When placing orders with Amazon and other delivery services, please be sure they have your full address, including your unit number. Packages are often delivered to the Community Center due to having incomplete addresses.

If your address is incomplete, you may not receive your packages. The office makes every effort to ensure packages mistakenly delivered to the office make their way to the addressee.

What Insurance Should I Have?

Please make sure the insurance you obtain as a resident of our community is for contents only (typically costs \$100-\$150 annually). We have come across some residents who have been paying insurance as if they owned the home. If you are paying much more than this, consider calling your insurance agent to make sure they understand you require only contents insurance – not homeowner’s insurance. The agent can call the office if more information is needed.

Stop Signs = STOP

With the nicer weather right around the corner, it is a great time to remind not only our guests but ourselves to be alert and considerate drivers. Please come to a complete stop and look both ways before proceeding. Stop signs are installed at every Court and other locations throughout the community.



One Way – Do Not Enter!

One-Way sign, Do Not Enter sign, and painted directional arrow are at the “triangle” driveway entrance of the community center parking lot. These precautions were put in place to avoid a collision with someone leaving the community center parking lot.



Community Speed Limit

Please drive safely and be aware of people walking, pulling out of parking spaces and garages.

If Snow is Predicted . . .

Remember to call the office as soon as you can for a forecasted snow event if you need to get out for an appointment; have caregivers, family or friends coming to your home; need to get out on a regular basis (e.g., working, dialysis, or cancer treatments). It does not matter if the event is reported on a Monday for potential snow on a Thursday. There is an established snow removal plan for the community. Refer to your binder for complete snow/ice removal policy.

Trash/Recycle on Snow Days

Please remember that trash/recycle pick up may be delayed during or right after a snow event. Our first priority is to have the community cleared of snow as soon as we can.

Be Courteous and Friendly

“Word of Mouth” is our biggest marketing avenue. Visitors are invited to attend our marketing events throughout the month. You never know who could be your new next door neighbor.

As a reminder, some of our residents have help throughout the week with various household chores. There will be times when you will see an unfamiliar face at the trash/recycle dumpsters. Please remember to be kind and courteous.

Community Center Parking

The activity in the community center has increased significantly. Occasionally, groups/events overlap and parking is a little tight. Please be courteous to the residents that live in the vicinity of the community center and **do not park in a numbered parking space that is not assigned to you.**

Every home in the community is assigned a parking space. **Parking spaces with numbers are reserved for that particular home.** Please remind your visitors to park in un-numbered spaces.

In addition, when our staff and/or Police/EMTs are dispatched to our community, they use the parking space numbers as a quick check to see if the resident is home.

Office Telephones



We are finding that when residents call the office and do not get an answer, they hang up and call right back. Your call is important to us. However, if your call is not answered, the front office staff are on the phone with another person, helping someone at the window or a combination of both. **Please leave a detailed message** as to why you are calling. We can then return your call with a solution in hand.

Eye Glasses

Has your eye prescription changed? Do you have a collection of eye glasses you no longer use? Stop by the Salon area in the Community Center and drop them in the eye glasses donation/collection box. These eye glasses are donated to a local eye doctor.



Friendly Pet Reminder

Please be courteous to your neighbors and do not allow your dog(s) to “relieve” themselves on buildings, sidewalks, shrubbery/mulch or lawn ornaments.

Excrement must be picked up immediately.

Pet Policy Reminder

- All pets are to be registered with the office including guests' pets. Call the office to obtain a Pet Registration form.
- When outside, animals must be leashed and under full personal control of an adult at all times.
- Pets may not be tied outside on front porches or back patios.

Work orders relating to grounds must be made by contacting the office.

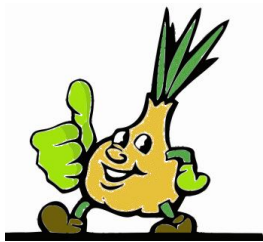
SRC Administration and Realty Landscaping agree that any concerns or issues with work activities being performed by Realty should be reported directly to the office.

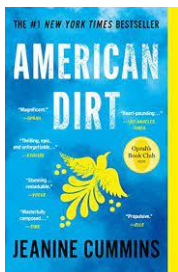

Brown Bag ART History: “Free at Last” ***Wednesday, March 6 at 12 Noon***

Led by Pottstown Art Historian Martin Bradfield. For this 7th lecture, Martin has put together a fascinating presentation which covers philosophical as well as artistic interpretations of the “Nature of Freedom”. He surveys and illuminates many famous images throughout the centuries, including sculptures by Michelangelo, the Statue of Liberty and many more.

In addition, Martin interweaves his personal history and credits August 28, 1963 as a seminal day, both in his own life and in the political tapestry of the United States-The anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.’s, “I Have a Dream” speech. Martin was one of the 250,000 attendees who marched in Washington on that steamy summer day and he will offer images from that event, and also re-enact the famous speech to give it a current, timely and immediate impact.

To tie it all together is a “mystery” piece which was specially commissioned by Martin for this talk- a piece that asks as many questions as it answers-questions that define us and also the eras in which we live. Elements of Art History, Politics, Philosophy, Philology, and Personal History, all combined.

Visiting the Amazing Ringing Rocks Park near Pottstown, PA

While there are many boulder fields scattered throughout Pennsylvania, there are very few that possess a very specific property: they ring when they are hit with a hammer. In fact, these fields are quite rare with only a handful known in the entire world. However, in Montgomery County, PA, you'll find Ringing Rocks Park.

Ringing Rocks Park is located in Lower Pottsgrove Township. This is one of three publically-accessible ringing rock fields in Pennsylvania. Not only are these fields incredibly beautiful, but they do indeed ring when you hit them with a hammer (Make sure you bring a hammer with you from home when you visit the park). The park not only features this great ringing rocks field, but also a baseball field, picnic pavilions and even a rollerskating rink.

The ringing rock field was figured to be discovered in the 1740s, making it the oldest documented of the three fields in Pennsylvania. For the next 150 years, it was somewhat of an attraction for locals, though it wasn't widely known.

In the 1890s, a group of local businessman created the Ringing Rocks Electric Railway Co. and started to build a small trolley park around the field. Over time, the park grew and both rides and an observation tower were added to the site.

In the 1950s, the park was purchased by the local fire department. They shut down the amusement park, but the area remained a popular spot for locals to visit.

The field here is only about 100 feet from the parking area, and the rocks on the edge of the field generally ring pretty well, meaning that almost anyone can visit the field and those that can't leave the car could see and hear someone hitting the rocks from the parking area.

Of course, while you don't have to go into the rock field to find ringing rocks, carefully walking through the rock field and banging on a variety of rocks is a ton of fun. As you move through the field, you may find a few duds, but overall, the rocks here ring really nicely, and it's fun to hit different rocks to hear different sounds.

If you happen to be having trouble finding rocks that ring, look for spots that have obvious damage from being hit by hammers. These spots are especially easy to find near the edge of the field.



If you are wondering why the rocks ring at the park, no one is quite sure. While significant testing has never been done, it has been shown that rocks removed from the field no longer produce an audible ringing noise. Because of that, it's thought that the sound is caused by a combination of the makeup of the rocks and the resonance of those rocks against the others around them.
