Manager's Memo . . .

My 16-year old has been playing golf for just about 2 years now and has really turned very quickly into a very good player. The golf swing came pretty easy to him and if you were to watch him, you would think he had been playing for years. Yesterday was a tournament for school golf teams in our area in which those with the best 16 scores would move on to the next tournament. He practiced and played a lot the week prior to the tournament. While well prepared, he did not play well on the tournament day and will not advance to the next tournament. He was devastated to say the least.

As adults, we know things like this are not the most important things in life. However, they do serve as great learning opportunities. In my son's case, he will have a choice to give up the game, which would be the easiest thing to do or to continue to work and only get better. (I am sure the latter will be his choice.) The experience will only make him a better golfer when the next tournament comes around.

As in my son's situation, we have several young staff members who have a good educational background but who may struggle at times when working directly in a resident's home. Working in a resident's home is similar to my son's playing in his golf tournament. The young workers feel the pressure to "score" well with the repair job for the sake of the resident. They also feel the pressure to demonstrate their abilities to their supervision. We have thrown some of these young guys into some significant challenges. This was not our plan. As we brought them on, we had the intent of having them work alongside an experienced staffer. Fortunately, or unfortunately, depending on your perspective, we have become extremely busy with sales and our most experience staff have been needed to prepare homes for move ins.

I felt it important to explain the circumstances of our younger staff. While you deserve the best of service, I ask for your patience as our younger staff develops. We will continue to provide more training to our younger staff as time permits. We will be encouraging them to not fear calling the more experienced staff for assistance if struggles arise. We are also looking for your feedback. With this in mind, please consider contacting the office with any comments that will help in our developing them into the best that they can be.

Face Masks, Social Distancing and Sign-In Sheet Reminders

(Detailed information can be found on the flyers posted for the Exercise Room and Salon.)

- **FACE MASKS** MUST BE WORN:
 - Community Center
 - Exercise Room
 - Salon (by both Stylist and Customer)
 - Common Areas and Hallways in the Garden Apartments
- Maintain **6 feet** social distance
- All users must complete the information on the log in sheet before using the Exercise Room and Salon for tracking purposes

The bridge area in the garden apartments remains closed.

Tree Services

We have identified a number of trees in the community that need to be cut down. The majority of these are green ash trees that have been decimated by an invasive pest. With this in mind, Martin's Tree Service will begin removal of some of the trees on October 3 and 4. Please note this is a weekend when we do not normally do such work but was necessary due to the high demand of tree removal services in our area.

They will commence work in the E and F sections. Additional trees not removed on this weekend will be scheduled at a later date. They will be moving their equipment behind C section so residents in C 5-17 may have trucks and trailers coming in behind their homes for those days. As with all landscaping services, it is weather dependent.

Fall Shrub Trimming

Penn Outdoor will begin fall shrub trimming the 2nd week of October at SRC. Once SRC has been completed, they will then move to BRC.

(The schedule is dependent upon weather.)

Heater Inspections

Beginning in October and continuing throughout the fall and winter months, our maintenance team will be performing heater safety inspections. The majority of the inspections will take place early morning and entirely in the mechanical room. With the exception of units with heating systems located in the basement and apartments whose mechanical rooms are accessed from inside the unit, no attention at all will be required from the resident.

Fall Maintenance Items



With cooler weather coming, it will soon be time to change your heater return vents and filters. There is a simple way to remember which vents need to be open or closed. For winter, open the bottom vents (to keep your feet warm) and close the top vents. Should you need assistance in changing the vents, please call the office to be placed on the list. The maintenance staff will be coming around to change the filters.

You can run your heater before the return vents are changed. The vents only assist in giving better circulation of the heat. We recommend testing your heater prior to the onset of cold weather. The staff would appreciate your testing Monday thru Friday from 9 AM to 3 PM and contact the Office during normal business hours with any issues. This will prevent emergency calls to our maintenance staff.

Dryer Vents

The maintenance staff does not routinely clean dryer vents. Please contact the Office should you experience longer drying cycles or clothes still being damp after a typical drying cycle. This could indicate the dryer vent needs to be cleaned.

Hate to Say It . . . SNOW?

Now is the time to make sure we have a copy of your car key for snow removal especially if you are a new resident or have gotten a new car. Please call the office with any questions.

- It is NOT mandatory to participate with this snow policy.
- A set of your car keys will be kept and locked in our office for our snow crew to be able to move your car at their convenience for plowing.
